

Faculty of Education Attached Schools

The Faculty of Education administers junior high schools, elementary schools, kindergartens and a school for children with special needs.

In the Takamatsu area, these facilities have promoted leading research in educational practices for individual school categories, contributing to the introduction of "integrated study periods" in the national curriculum guidelines. In the Sakaide area, the junior high, elementary school, kindergarten, and school for children with special needs attract the attention of educators throughout the nation by developing nation-leading collaborative projects such as joint athletic events and research projects.

The School for Special Needs' Students in Sakaide offers elementary, junior high, and high school classes. Aiming to foster independence and social inclusion of mentally challenged children, it conducts consistency in education spanning the twelve years from elementary school to high school that meets individual student's needs, cooperate with their guardians and engages in advanced initiatives to support students. Adjacent to Sakaide Junior High is the special classroom named "Subaru", which conducts pioneering practical research projects focused on therapeutical education for young children and elementary/junior high pupils in Kagawa Pref. with learning disorders and attention-deficit hyperactivity disorders.

Takamatsu Elementary School

Starting in FY2013, the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology designates the Takamatsu school as a research and development school. For four years, the school will conduct research on the subject of "fostering children able to work together to open up a bright future". In April, it held a gathering to form school classes that include children of different grades. Attendees decided school objectives and school class names together.



Sakaide Elementary School

The annual School Festival in November represents an experience event involving children, parents, and teachers. The event is related to the new subject named "integrated studies". The photo shows fifth graders making traditional noodles. They made and enjoyed various local noodle recipes.



Takamatsu Junior High School

The attached junior high in Takamatsu aims to develop a new curriculum focused on "future-oriented studies", part of the new subject named integrated studies. In addition, the school studies how to develop good learning skills by a personalized approach.



Sakaide Junior High School

The junior high in Sakaide aims to foster "independent learners", who take interest in various things, find problems on their own, and think through to achieve solutions. The integrated studies taught here include the "Shuttle" and "CAN" subtopics. Shuttle connects the learning of individual subjects with research conducted in integrated studies. CAN allows children to conduct free investigations in inter-grade groups.



School for Special Needs' Students

In the aim for children's proactive social participation, it is working to improve lessons in which students with a purpose, work on their activities. And every November, many people participate in "Fureai" Fair to deepen relationships with students.



Kindergarten

In July, all kindergarten children and their parents held a "Cool Evening Meet" for fun. Older children generate ideas to create attractions that younger children can enjoy. In 2013, participants brainstormed, drew pictures and created a course for a Ghost Maze. It is an event that is filled with smiles and satisfaction every year.



Resource Room "SUBARU"

This facility provides individual instructions on academic subjects and social skills development for children with special needs who are enrolled in ordinary junior high schools, elementary schools, kindergartens, and nursery schools. It also offers parents and teachers educational counseling.
