About Kagawa University



Kagawa University is a national, comprehensive university. The university has six faculties; Education, Economics, Law, Agriculture, Medicine, and Engineering. There are more than 6000 students studying here, of which, over 200 are international students.

About Takamatsu City

The university is situated in Takamatsu City (population over 400,000). It is a mid-sized city, with the main station (Takamatsu Station) beautifully located at a seafront space called Sunport. Takamatsu City is home to a well-known Japanese garden called 'Ritsurin Park'.

About Kagawa Prefecture

Kagawa Prefecture is the smallest prefecture in Japan, and has a population of about 1,000,000. The climate is Mediterranean-like, with pleasant temperatures throughout the year. Some summers, however, can be a little hot. The cost of living is considerably lower compared to other parts of Japan

About 'Sanuki'

'Sanuki' is the old name of Kagawa. This name is synonymous with 'udon', a thick wheat noodle that is wildly popular among the local population. Udon shops are ubiquitous in all of Kagawa and it is no wonder that Kagawa's nickname is 'Udon Prefecture'. In addition, Kagawa is number one in the production of olives, fans, and gloves. She takes pride in having the longest walking shopping arcade in Japan, the biggest man-made lake in Japan, and has the most number of sunny days compared to other prefectures in Japan.

About Transport

Takamatsu City is directly connected to Kansai International Airport by limousine bus. Domestic flights are available from Haneda Airport, Narita Airport, and Naha Airport. In addition, direct international flights connect Takamatsu Airport to Shanghai, Seoul, Hong Kong, and Taipei.

Program description



Sanuki Program offers an opportunity for undergraduate exchange students from our overseas partners to experience a semester of study at a Japanese university. Students can choose the classes to fit their level of Japanese Language ability. The 'flagship' course is 'Project Sanuki', whereby exchange students work with local students to research on specific issues related to 'Sanuki' or Kagawa. From 2020 onwards, students shall focus on environmental issues associated with the Seto Inland Sea.

Period of program



There are two intakes per academic year. The Spring intake is on April, and finishes in August. The Fall intake starts from October and ends in February the following year.

Target students



The program primarily targets undergraduate students who are enrolled full time at a university having an exchange agreement with Kagawa University. However, students from universities that do not have exchange agreements may also be considered as candidates. Students participating in the Sanuki Program should be those who are recommended by the home university on the basis of their academic performance, behavior and motivation. In addition, students should possess a certain level of oral communication skills in English and/or Japanese.

Language requirements & academic standing



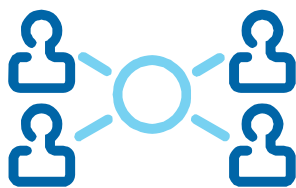
With regards to Japanese Language ability, Sanuki Program accepts students from elementary level to advanced level. However, students with Japanese Language elementary level should have a good command of English Language. All students should have a good academic standing and personal record at the home institution, and have earned a respectable GPA.

Courses in the program



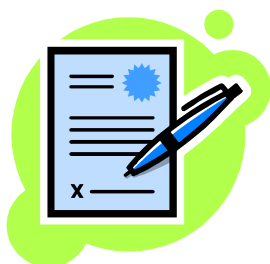
Depending on the language ability, courses taken may differ from student to student. For beginners in Japanese language, we provide basic language instruction. For those with N2 or N1 in Japanese language, they can enroll for the 'regular' classes that are conducted in the Japanese language. All Sanuki Program students take some common courses that are conducted in both English and Japanese. Among them, a course called 'Project Sanuki' stands out as the 'flagship' course for the program.

Connection with the major courses



As noted above, students with N2 or N1 level of Japanese Language may be able to take 'regular' courses in their major field in the related faculties. KUIO shall try to coordinate with the appropriate faculty to assist students in enrolling for the classes. For these students, we recommend that they refer to our brochure in Japanese Language.

Application procedure



All applications must go through the international division at the applicant's university. Students first fill up application documents in electronic format. A Checklist is provided, and students can check the item boxes accordingly. When all the documents (including the Checklist itself) are properly prepared, hand over the electronic copies to the international division at your university.

Interview by Zoom



Where necessary, we may request students to undergo a 15 to 20 minute interview via Zoom as part of the application procedure. This is to allow us to verify the student's academic background, behavior, motivation, and oral communication skills (as mentioned in the previous page under 'Target students'). As an example, if a student is found to have significantly weak oral communication skills, the application may be declined.

Number of hours/classes in program



Japanese immigration laws require full-time international students to take at least 10 hours of classes per week. This translates to a minimum of 7 classes per week.

Course descriptions

Elementary Japanese classes

(Shioi, Takamizu), total 6 credits

Students can learn basic skills of the Japanese language: listening, speaking, reading, and writing. By mastering Japanese alphabet and basic expressions, students can start communicating with Japanese people in Japanese, which will make your life in Japan easier and more comfortable both in campus and in a local community. These skills will also lead to a better understanding of Japanese culture and community.

Plastics, the environment and human society

(Lrong), 2 credits

This class consists of three parts. Part 1 introduces the world of plastics, from its invention to the current stage of production. Part 2 looks into the negative impact of plastic use on the environment from the viewpoint of marine, air, and land. Part 3 probes the role of plastic on human society, especially on the questionable effects on human diet and health.

Japanese current affairs

(Onoe), 2 credits

The aim of this course is to introduce Japan to international students through studying various areas of Kagawa. Overview of Shikoku and Kagawa, Overview of Japan (Politics and Economics), and Various aspects of development will be discussed.



Japanese current affairs

(Takigawa), 2 credits



This course aims to help international students deepen their understanding of Japan and spark their interest through looking at regional features of Kagawa, such as landscapes, geography, industries, environment, history, arts, and culture. The course consists of lectures as well as field activities in Kagawa. A few lectures are given by guest speakers who are specialists in specific fields.

Leading Edge Issues in Kagawa University

(Lrong, Takamizu, Shioi), 1 credit



This course presents a broad introduction to students to the 'leading edge' issues that is happening in the university. These issues cover the research, education, and contribution to the community conducted by the academic staff members of the university. The language used is English, and a different lecturer takes over the class in an omnibus system. Students include both the local Japanese students and those from abroad.

Project Sanuki

(Lrong, Takamizu, Shioi), 1 credit



'Project Sanuki' is a research based course whereby international students work with Japanese students on issues related to Sanuki/Kagawa. From 2020 onwards, the focus is on environmental issues surrounding the Japan Inland Sea. This focus fits ideally into the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) as espoused by the United Nations. We believe students will benefit tremendously from learning hands-on with members of the local community, the many issues/problems/prospects in relation to the Seto Inland Sea.

Plastics, Global Trade, and the Environment

(Lrong), 2 credits



This course revolves around the world of plastics, starting from its creation, to trade on the global arena, to the impact on the environment and on human lives. Topics are clustered accordingly into three segments. In the first segment, we look at how plastics came into being, how it was invented and how it is manufactured. We examine the merits of plastic as a raw material followed by the role plastics play in our daily lives, and the benefits it brings. In the second segment, we probe into the world of trade in plastic goods and plastic wastes. The third segment leads us to investigate the adverse sides of plastics in the environment and in the health of animals and human beings resulting from plastic-based garbage. Through the framework of Circular Economy, we explore ways to minimize the harmful effects of plastic-based garbage.

Assignment of supervisors



Each student is assigned a supervisor from KUIO. This supervisor guides the student in matters relating to daily living, and courses in the program. Depending on the situation and need, a supporting supervisor from the appropriate faculty may be assigned. This supervisor may advise the student in academic issues relating to the major subject.

Student supporters

All students in this program are paired with 'student supporters' who offer assistance in daily living. In addition, staff members at KUIO and other divisions (such as Health Clinic) are always ready to lend support to international students in times of need.



Extracurricular activities



The university organizes several field trips for international students. They include visits to factories, museums, and well known parks. In these field trips, students have the opportunity to learn about things like making Japanese sweets, Japanese fans, or udon noodles. The President of the university hosts a big reception party for international students at year end.

Student activities (KUFSA, ICES, student clubs)



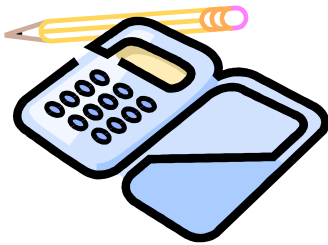
By default, all international students of the university belong to the Kagawa University Foreign Students Association (KUFSA). Together with a Japanese student club called Kagawa University Inter-Cultural Exchange Society (ICES), events are conducted throughout the year. These events include welcome and farewell parties, day trips to islands in the Seto Inland Sea, autumn leaves viewing, and traditional New Year events (see calendar above). In addition, ICES and KUFSA also conduct a series of 'Lunch Presentation Meetings'. International students may also join one of many student clubs such as Kendo, Tea Ceremony, or Japanese traditional music club.

Accommodation



University dormitories are available for the students. The rent ranges from 10000 to about 23000 yen per month. We shall assist students to apply for these rooms. However, due to the limited number of dormitory rooms, we may not be able to accommodate the desire of students. In such a case, we shall assist students to look for a room in private apartments.

Costs



Exchange students coming through the university exchange agreement shall have their tuition fees waived. However they are responsible for the air fares, room costs, living costs, health insurance costs, medical costs, and other incidentals such as internet and telephone. Depending on the individual lifestyle, living costs (including insurances) can range from about 30000 yen to 50000 yen or more per month.

Scholarship



Depending on the circumstance (year and budget), scholarships may be available for certain selected students. These scholarships may come from the Kagawa University International Foundation, or from Japan Student Services Organization (JASSO). When appropriate, KUIO shall inform the parties concerned. However, students will only know if they can obtain the scholarship after arriving at Kagawa University.

Part-time job



Officially, we do not encourage students to take up part-time jobs especially as a way to earn money to support their daily living. At the outset, we advise students to secure sufficient funds to put them through the duration of the program without having to rely on part-time jobs.

Upon completion of the program



A closing ceremony is planned for students who successfully complete the program. Students shall be awarded a Certificate of Completion.

Thereafter, KUIO shall send the transcripts to the university of the student for further processing.

Beyond the program



This program is designed for only one semester. Students who wish to continue studying for one more semester may consider registering as exchange students in the appropriate faculty for the remaining six months. However, please note that almost all classes in the undergraduate level are conducted in Japanese Language. Which means to say that students need to have achieved at least Level N2 to be able to sit in those classes.
